Date: October 26, 2022

Methodology:

Breakthrough Campaigns conducted interviews with 319 likely November 2022 general election Voters of Color (voters who self-identified as Black/African American, Latino/a/x or Hispanic, Asian or Pacific Islander, Middle Eastern, or Native American) in Connecticut from October 13 to October 17, 2022. Participants were contacted via live calls, SMS-to-web, and email. While it is not possible to calculate a true margin of error for an online non-probability-based sample, the margin of error for a sample size of n=319 is ±5.44 percentage points at the 95% confidence level.

Key Findings:

- Voters of Color in Connecticut overwhelmingly intend to vote “Yes” on Question 1, the amendment to allow the General Assembly to provide for early voting.
 - ✓ The ballot starts off with a strong majority (71%) voting “Yes,” including nearly half (49%) that say they would “Definitely vote Yes.”
 - ✓ Fewer than 1 in 5 (18%) Voters of Color indicate they would oppose this ballot, giving the “Yes” vote a 53-point margin in the final weeks before the election.
- While Voters of Color overall are supportive of Question 1, there are some key differences within different subgroups.
 - ✓ Women of Color (74% “Yes” / 12% “No”), Black/African American voters (78% “Yes” / 7% “No”), and Voters of Color over the age of 50 (76% “Yes” / 16% “No”) are the most likely to say they will vote “Yes.”
 - ✓ While Men of Color (67% Yes / 25% “No”) and Latino/a/x voters (64% “Yes” / 26% “No”) are a little more likely to say they will vote “No” – a strong majority of Voters of Color across demographics indicate they will vote “Yes.”
- One reason Voters of Color are so supportive of this ballot may be that a majority (52%) say they would vote early at least sometimes, if they had the option.
 - ✓ Black/African American voters (65%) are especially likely to say they would vote early at least sometimes.
 - ✓ In their own words, Voters of Color described the various reasons they would vote early if given the option:

“I work full-time and don't always have the flexibility to be in my town on election day and may not qualify for mail in voting, so if I knew that Election Day was going to be very busy and tight on timing, I would choose to vote early to ensure that I voted.”

“Convenience and making sure my voice is heard. I work long days and many voting days I potentially can miss.”

“Getting older doesn't always allow the ability to move and get around as easily as when you are younger. Illness would be a determining factor. The ability to obtain transportation would be another.”

“My work schedule would determine the day I vote. If I have an option to get out to vote earlier and skip the lines, then that would benefit me.”
